BACKGROUND

JANA VIKAS, in its drive for human development of the poor, needy and the marginalized, implemented the major projects like "Sustainable Development of Women through Cooperatives", "Strengthening of People Led Development, "Securing Cultural Identity and reviving indigenous communities", "Prevention of Human Trafficking", "Empowerment of Minority Children in Education and Child Protection through exercising Child Right", "Learning Recovery Program for Students of Covid-19 Pandemic in Kandhamal", "Skill Development for unemployed youth through Driving Training", "Minority Rights Group Europe (MRGE), "Improving Quality of Life among the Religious Minorities in Odisha (IQLRM)" and "People Led Development for Food Soverignity".

The main aim of these major projects is to reduce provety, promotion of organic farming to increase food security, enhance livelihood for a dignified living for farmers, SHGs and community; integrate joyful learning for the children who are weak in studies and reach out to many people for prevention of Covid. It was made possible with the support of national and international organisations whose humanitarian aid enable us to serve better. Jana Vikas focused on People Led Development hence created and strengthened communities and SHGs to strengthen the capacity of communities to have a vioce in decisions, planning and design effective methods of agriculture and sustainable livelihood to aleviate unemployment and malnutrition.

AN OVERVIEW ON JANA VIKAS

JANA VIKAS is a grass root Non-Government Organization (NGO) based at K. Nuagaon Block of Kandhamal district, Odisha. This organization was registered under Society Registration Act 1860 on September 16th, 1992.

In Odia language "JANA" means 'People' and "VIKAS" means 'Development'. It is evolving as capacity building organization and has also partnered with various NGOs and Govt departments and have formed consortium at different levels to address issues at District, State and National level. Presently, the organization is working in 6 districts, 14 blocks, 36 Gram Panchayats and 980 villages. The focus is still on marginalized Dalit, indigenous tribes, minority and other backward communities.

The organization has clear strategic plan for the year 2018-2022. The thematic areas are Livelihood, Education, Governance, Women Empowerment and Violence against Women and Peace Building and Disaster Response. The organization has also policies which are providing better governance in terms of transparency and accountability. Human Resource (HR), Finance, Gender, Child Protection, Anti-Sexual Harassment, Safeguarding Disability, Environment Protection and Contingency policies are mandatory to be practiced by all the stakeholders associated with the organization.



Jana Vikas visualizes a holistic & sustainable society where the people live in unity amidst diversity based on social and human values of justice and equity.



To sensitize, organize, enable, empower and develop the poor and marginalized especially the Adivasi, Dalit and OBCs to respond to their issues, needs, problems and vulnerability by using their existing



Facilitating people led development processes amongst NGO Partners in India towards achieving food sovereignty gives an opportunity to be linked with many grassroot organizations.



Prashanti Culture Resource Centre to Promote and Preserve Local Culture & Traditions

- ➤ 2479 people from local community within the district, outside the district of Odisha and even outside of Odisha have visited Prashanti Cultural resource centre, Surubali and have interacted, shared and exchanged their cultural heritage and practices.
- ➤ 28 trainings, workshops and meetings have been organized at the centre.
- ➤ 1 Compost Pit has been constructed to increase biodiversity in the soil by attracting different insects, bacteria, fungi, that are beneficial to the crop and for promoted organic farming, this became a demo field to showcase the importance of traditional farming practice to the farmers and the

visitors. Around 50 kg of earthworm has been grownup at the centre.






traditional comb, leaf plate and cup, traditional thrasher have been preserved and exhibited to the visitors and community members.
